Altitudes along roads and to Trig! Stations obtained by Spirit Levelling, are written thus 300., the dot showing the spot at which the altitude is taken.

Altitudes with the letters B.M. marked A against them, refer to marks made on Buildings, Walls, Milestones, &c.

Note: Where any Boundary other than County or Administrative County is coincident with Civil Parish Boundary, the Symbol for the latter is shown, other Areas being denoted by description along the Boundary.
